How Old is "White Sue"?

Question: "Black Joe" is now 24 years old, which is twice the age that "White Sue" was when "Black Joe" was as old as "White Sue" is now.

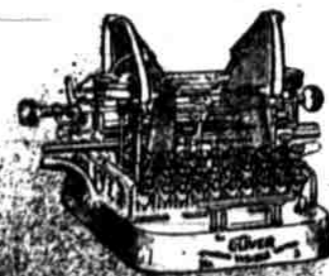
