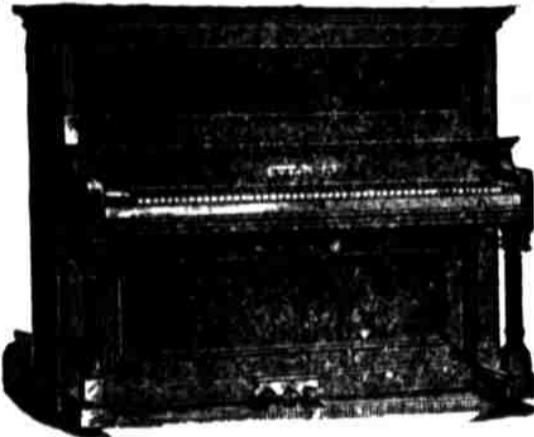

Engineering 1

A third division in electrical engineering 8 has been formed, which will meet on Monday and Wednesday.

The electrical department has procured a new arc lamp which does away with the acetylene projecting lantern. This lantern is used in street railway lectures.
