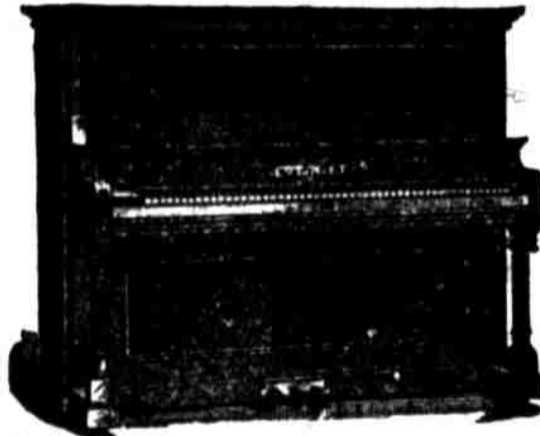

The following communication has been received from John White, formerly professor in chemistry and who is now at the head of the chemistry department at the Rose Polytechnic Institute at Terra Haute, Ind. Although it seems that concern for the immediate welfare of athletics here will be removed, yet we publish the letter as coming from a former member of our faculty and a friend of our institution: Editor of The Nebraskan:

It is with the greatest regret that I observe in one of your recent issues that the board of regents of the University of Nebraska has, by its action in regard to the location of the new Physics building, as well as by the new ruling in regard to military drill, struck, what appears to me, a death-blow to athletics in that institution. As one long connected with the university, and also to some extent with athletic affairs there, I feel impelled to say a few words voicing my disappointment over the outcome.

I in no wise wish to be considered as among those—if there be any such—who regard athletics as of interest paramount to that of science, and if it were merely a question of no athletics or no physics building, I should not hesitate—athletics would have to go. But are the regents confronted by such a dilemma? Is it not possible to maintain both, without impairment to either? I think so.

I have known enough of the history of athletics in the University to be in a position to say that, without question, if the athletic field is moved from the campus at this time, it means death to the cause; an athletic field must be in close proximity to the university, else it makes it nearly impossible for the candidates for the various teams to practice, and it kills all interest in athletics among the student body, without which there can be nothing done in the athletic line. Of course the big games might be just as well attended, but what is needed above that is student attendance and student interest in the practice itself. Each student ought to know just what each and every member of the team can do and either be able to spur him on to greater effort or, by encouraging him and showing a proper appreciation of him, keep him up to his standard.

Athletics has a proper place in the university life, and should be encouraged under proper control.

I hope very much that some sort of a compromise can be effected whereby the best interests of both the Physics department and of athletics may be attained without clashing. Sincerely yours,
