The Olympic Games.

Two notices from the physical cultime department of the St. Louis Exposition have been sent out, announcing the Olympic handicae meet and the Olympic college championship contest, both to be held in the stadium at the Exposition this summer. The Olympic meet will occur Saturday, May 21, 1904. The following handicap events are open to amateur athletes of the world registered with A. A. U. and Y. M. C A.: '100, 220, 440, and 880-yard dashes; two-mile run; 120 and 220 hurdles; pole-vault; running high jump and running broad jump; throwing 56pound weight; 15-pound hammer; putting 16-pound shot, and throwing discus. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded to the winners of the flist, second and third places, respectively in each event. Entrance fees of fifty cents will be charged, fees to accompany all entries. Right is reserved to reject any entry. Entries for this meet will close May 1, 1904.

The contest for the college gymnaeium championships will be held Thursday and Friday. May 12th and Good Things to Eat 13th. The following events are open for college men of the world: Parallel bars, horizontal bars, flying rings. tumbling, side-horse, and club-swinging: also a contest for the all-around college gymnasium championship. A gold medal emblematic of the Olympic college championship contest will be awarded to the winner in each event, a silver medal to the second, and a bronze medal to the third. A separate set of championship medals will be given for the all-round college championships. An entrance fee of one dollar will be charged in each event, and one dollar entrance fee for the alltound championship contest. Entries will close April 25, 1904. All applications should be addressed to James E. Sullivan, chief of the department of physical culture, Universal Exposition, St. Louis, Mo.
