Plan A Concert.

A concert by the Glee club has been announced, to occur some time soon, probably next month. This will be the first appearance of the club this year, although a short program will perhaps be rendered in chapel in a few weeks, before the concert comes off. The club has been somewhat delayed in its work this year by the necessity of having to secure a new director, and also by the fact that an entirely new list of selections has been secured for this year.

It has not been decided yet whether the concert will be held in Memorial hall or in the Olliver. At all events it is intended to make it a fitting introduction of the club to University and Lincoln people.

A number of trips to towns throughout the state is also in contemplation, although nothing definite has been decided upon as yet. It will be remembered that last year the club made a number of such trips with varying success. Under the leadership of Professor Eames, of the Conservatory, the club will doubtless experience a most prosperous season, whether the trips are made or not.

The club is at present composed of thirty members. Regular practice has been held every week for some time, and University people will observe with considerable interest the progress that has been made.

Prizes for City Schools.

The announcement is made that the board of directors of the Art association has made an appropriation to make awards to the schools attending the art exhibit, graded according to the per cent of the total enrollment of each school that was present at one of the meetings at least. Fifty dollars have been placed in the hands of Mrs. T. M. Hodgman and Miss Sarah Webster, instructor in art in the city schools, for the purpose of buying pictures to be awarded as prizes. For four or five years the board has made an annual expenditure of \$50 for this purpose. The pictures are all masterpieces and are photographs made by the famous Baum, the great German artist. These are highly prized by both teachers and pupils. No school whose representation did not exceed 50 per cent of the total enrollment is thus rewarded.

Fine Work on Geological Subject

The geology department has on its shelves a copy of an excellent work entitled, "Report on the Geological and Water Resources of Nebraska west of the One Hundred and Third Meridian." This pamphlet contains some fine cuts of famous natural scenes of Nebraska, such as Chimney Rock, Courthouse Rock, views in the Bad Lands and views of irrigated country, as well as a fine map of the state and charts. A postal card addressed to Charles D. Wolcott, director of the geological survey, at Washington, D. C., will secure a copy of this work free. Darton's Report on the Black Hills can also be obtained in the same way from the same source.

Geology Excursion Planned.

The geology department is contemplating the organization of a field excursion this spring, in which some of the most desirable localities in eastern Nebraska will be visited and their geology studied. As in past years the party will probably go to the Platte, striking the valley at Ashland and visiting South Bend, Ashland and Cedar Creek. The Lincoln high school class may also go and co-operate in the excursion and thus the party would be considerably swelled.
