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A DECIDING GAME

Sophomores and Freshmen to Settle Rival Claims Tonight.

The basket-ball season closes tonight with the game between the Freshmen and Sophomores for the interclass championship. The varsity season ended Saturday night with the Wisconsin victory. Negotiations for the western trip and for a game with Iowa have fallen through and the team has ceased practice. The schedule this year was not nearly as complete as last year's, only four outside games being played. The team came out a little better than even on the season, and by the victory over the Badgers Saturday added quite a little glory to themselves.

The game tonight will be fiercely contested from the first whistle, and promises to be as exciting as any class game ever played. The Freshmen feel that they can stand the strain of being champions for a year or so and the Sophomores are determined to hold the palm for another season at least. The make-up of the teams and the team from which each man comes are as follows:

Freshmen: Forwards, Miller, South Omaha High; Swan, Omaha High; center, Mosher; guards, Lott, South Omaha High; Hammill, Lincoln Y. M. C. A.

Sophomores: Forwards, Mathewson, Lincoln High; Kummell, Lincoln High; center, Krake, West Point High; guards, Winchester, Lincoln High; Clark, Cheyenne High.

Everybody who attended the finals last year, when the Sophs defeated the present Senior team by the score of 25 to 24, will be sure and go tonight and take all their friends. It is especially desirable that a few men from each class get together and do a little rooting for their teams. If any money is left over from the gate receipts after the expenses have been paid it will go to the winning team to do with as they please, the team generally deciding to buy caps or Jerseys. The Freshmen are especially desirous of winning this distinction, since they lost the same privilege in football by such a slender margin.

About a hundred students warmed themselves on the bleachers yesterday afternoon during the baseball practice. About twenty-five men were in uniform, including Captain Townsend. After an hour's work they divided for a practice game, which showed that a marked improvement both in batting and fielding had occurred since the first of the season. Among the new candidates is Eager, who is trying for first base. As yet Miller and Barta are the only men trying for the backstop position, Bender not yet having gotten out. The pitching department is still the strongest. Townsend, Morse and Beltzer of last year's team are out, and also Adams, a Freshman from Wahoo. The first game is still several weeks off, and with a fair degree of good weather the team ought to be in the pink of condition before the intercollegiate season opens.

The athletic board met Monday and awarded basketball Jerseys and "N" sweaters to the following men: Elliott, Hagensick, Hewitt, Hoar, Benedict. A track meet with the University of Colorado to take place at Boulder was sanctioned, and the board consented to change the game with Colorado next fall from Denver to Boulder, an additional guarantee being made by Colorado.

Fire at Captain Smoke's House.

The following item from the Yale News concerns Captain Smoke, the former commandant of our cadet battalion:

"At about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon a fire broke out in the basement of Captain Smoke's house, No. 69 Wall street. Working upwards from the basement the fire burnt part way to the floor and wall of the library, and did considerable damage to the third floor as well before the firemen could get it under control. The blaze started in some way from the furnace and burnt for some time within the walls and flues before it was detected. The loss was principally confined to Captain Smoke's private papers and the furniture, which was not insured.

P. B. K. Arrangements.

The time is approaching for the P. B. K. announcements, as these will be made the day before the spring vacation opens up. For the first time in the history of the society this election will be announced at a later date than Charter Day. During the vacation there will be a meeting of the society, at which the new members will be banqueted. This change has been made for two reasons. TENNIS PROSPECTS

Change in Location of Courts. Minnesota Scheduled.

Indications are favorable for a tennis meet this spring between Minnesota and Nebraska. Secretary Tyner of the Tennis club has been in communication for some time with the tennis association of the University of Minnesota, and while no definite arrangements have as yet been made, it is probable that a tournament between the clubs of the two institutions will take place on our campus sometime during the latter part of May. If this arrangement is made, it is also likely that a return meet will be scheduled with the Gophers to come off in Minneapolis next fall.

The local club will begin the season, therefore, with a very bright outlook. While it will be necessary to move the courts about thirty feet south of their present location in order to make room for work on the new physics building, this will be immediately attended to, and it is thought that practice will not be seriously delayed. The club at present numbers about thirty men, and new applications for membership are expected to come in as soon as the season opens. While tennis is not supported in this university by the athletic department, it has of late years held no unimportant place in the athletics of the institution, and may be expected to command still further interest this year if the match with the Gophers is definitely arranged.

A meeting of the club will probably be held some time next week. At that time preparations for the coming season will be made, the Minnesota tournament discussed, and the matter of moving the courts attended to. The local management will be at considerable expense in bringing the Gophers to Nebraska, but it is thought that the extra inducements that will be afforded in arranging the meet will call forth enough patronage to make the venture a big success. Nebraska has put forth men in the past who have attained much more than merely local fame, and no uneasiness is felt that Minnesota will not have her hands full in meeting us in tennis this year. With such as Cassady, Mathewson, Tyner and Scribner, Nebraska ought surely to produce a winning team.

The tournament will probably be of two days' duration. The first day will be devoted to singles, and the second to doubles. Three games will be played in singles, with two men on a side. There will be but one contest, of course, in the doubles.

For the benefit of any who may desire to enter for the tournament, we are requested to state that \$1.50 will obtain full membership in the Tennis club.

Fixing Date With Kansas.

Secretary Ryner has received a note from Kansas asking for some date between April 15th and May 1st.
