THE COLLEGE SETTLEMENT

Mr. Arbuthnot Explains Mission of This Worthy Organization.

Mr. Arbuthnot spoke in chapel yesterday on "The College Settlement," the substance of his remarks was as follows

The College Settlement is not a mission to the unwashed. In a phase of its activity it appears as the latest institution that functions in the scheme of modern democratic education. In point of democracy it outranks all others. The purpose of these remarks is to indicate its place among its compeers.

There are three ends sought in education, the economic, the scholastic, and the cultural . The students in the professional school pursues his work with the first as the characteristic object. The man with the P. B. K. type of mind is guided by the second in the acquisition of knowledge for its own sake, as well as for the invidious distinction that is created between himself and the common run. The last is incarnate in the gentleman and scholar with whom it is pleasant to live. No one of the three is, as a rule, exclusive of the others, but the distinctions are pronounced enough to be differences.

In the nature of the case the College Settlement can do little to increase a man's acquisition capacity through giving special training of a technical kind. Its weakness as a promoter of scholastic learning is patent. In respect to the cultural side of life, however, the story is different. Here the Settlement stands in the front rank, giving the "pas" to no other educational institution.

Private persons have secured for their children the good things of the intellectual life at great cost in time and money. Religious organizations and individual citizens have, by establishing institutions of higher learning. lowered the pecuniary expense involved. The state through its university has made the outlay in money practically nothing to the student. All that he needs to furnish is the time and effort. But he must be able to afford the time. The vast majority of the population cannot pay this price. Their daily work allows only a few spent as they will. To meet the needs of tuese persons the College Settlement offers opportunities for cultural development at the minimum cost in money and in time.

The College Settlement seeks to make it possible that whosoever will may come for that which makes the subjective life of more account and renders human intercourse social. uemocratize the means of intellectual grace, to give a range of knowledge wide enough to permit the growth of sympathy and mutual understanding, to give that poise and stability that exists because of many points of contact with human interests, to strengthen mental grip and power, in short, to promote the diffusion of, culture; this is the function of the College Settlement as an educational institution.


