THE MEGRER CASE

Hon. W. Z. Snell gives able Discussion in Chapel.

The decision of the U. S. Supreme court in the Northern Securities merger case was discussed by Hon. W. Z. Snell during convocation period yesterday morning.

He began the discussion by saying that the suit was instituted by the United States against the Northern Securities company, and the two railroad companies, the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern and their leading stockholders for the purpose of dissolving the merger of the two railroads, which the United States declared had been formed by the creation of a holding company, the Northern Securities company. This consolidation is claimed to be a violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. It was asserted on behalf of the government that this consolidation was in effect a pool created to promote the interests not of one system at the expense of the other, but both at the expense of the public. The case was first heard in the Circuit court, and decided in favor of the United States, as a violation of the anti-trust law enacted by congress in July, 1890, holding these companies to ignore its provision and that the organization and operation of such a corporation is an unlawful restraint and monopoly of trade. In this decision the Supreme Court of the United States concurred by a majority of one vote, and the decision of Justice Harlan was handed down, which said, "No scheme or device could come more within the prohibition of the anti-trust law and it is within the meaning of the act a trust." Those who concurred in the dissenting opinion were led by Justice Holmes, who read the minority opinion, the substance of which was that the anti-trust law was construed as a criminal statute, and should be followed by criminal prosecution.

The merger decision was thoroughly covered, and those who were present were enabled to grasp some of the historic facts and the power of congress over interstate commerce as given by the highest tribunal.
