A STUDENTS WEEK.

**More Particulars Concerning
Student Affairs at St. Louis.**

Circulars are being sent out by the secretary of the Students' League of America, giving further particulars concerning the Students' week at St. Louis, when representatives from universities all over the country will be present. Concerning the league itself some facts are given out that aid in giving enlightenment.

The Students' League of America was organized last fall. Two branches were formed: One, known as the Intercollegiate branch, to include university and college men; and the other, the Interscholastic branch, to include students of the high schools, normal schools and private academies of the country.

The constitution reads: "The purpose of this league shall be to further interest in student activities, to reward merit in all phases of student life, and to increase the feeling of brotherhood among those attending educational institutions."

In pursuance of this purpose its directors decided to hold two conventions at St. Louis in June. The meeting of the Intercollegiate branch will be held from June 20 to June 25. The Olympic college championships will take place on June 24 and 25, so that all who attend the convention can see the games as well. The meeting of the Interscholastic branch will occur the last week in June, when the Interscholastic contests are in progress.

Arrangements are being made which will be the means of bringing together the largest body of students ever assembled. As many phases of student life as possible will be represented.

There will be a grand oratorical contest open to students of all colleges. The league is to give a cash prize for this event, which will decide the championship of the United States, and the exposition authorities will present various awards of merit.

A joint debate between teams of two great universities representing the east and the west will take place another evening. This is to be for the championship of America. A handsome trophy will be presented to the winning team and each individual will receive a suitable prize.

A grand band contest open to the various state university bands will also be a feature. These universities, which are situated for the most part in the west, have excellent musical organizations, numbering anywhere from 30 to 60 pieces. Several bands have signified their intention of entering, so the success of the affair is assured. A cash prize and a handsome trophy will be presented the best band.

An exhibition of college journalism is also being arranged. This will include all students publications from the daily paper to the class annual. Various awards of merit will be made.

An intercollegiate chess meet is also under way. This promises to attract the most prominent players of the country.

Other events are under discussion, and may be added. It is the intention of the league officials to call this week, "Student Week," and to make it all the name implies.
