DR. GREEN TOMORROW.

Prominent Medical Authority to Address Uni Men.

Throughout the year many specialists address the student body of this University, but as a general rule, what they have to say is especially interesting to but one class of students. There are, however, but few specialists who have something of vital interest and importance for every subject. Dr. J. L. Greene, Superintendent of the state hospital for insane, who will address University men in Memorial hall Sunday afternoon, is one of the few specialists who has something to say in which every man in the University has a deep interest. He will deliver an address on the subject, "A Thing Every Man Ought to Know," and the following statements of men prominent in city and University life, will indicate the esteem in which he is held:

Rev. John Lewis Marsh, pastor of the All Soul's Unitarian church of this city, says: "I consider this address by Dr. Greene eminently worthy and a fitting one—one that every man ought to hear."

Dr. H. C. Swearingen, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, said: "Dr. Greene is a practical man. He is dealing with life as it is, and speaks with authority on this important subject."

Dr. C. E. Condra has heard him speak on this subject, and says: "It will pay university men to hear this address by Dr. Greene. He knows his subject thoroughly, and has the ability to present it in good form. He will not moralize, but will give a plain statement of facts drawn from his own observations."

Professor Candy speaks in the highest terms of Dr. Greene and of his unusual ability in presenting this subject, which no man can afford to miss. He says that nothing should keep a University man away from this mass meeting.

Besides this excellent address special music of rare quality has been secured by those interested in the meeting. Mr. C. W. Tullys and Mr. H. E. Bradford, both well known soloists, will furnish the music. The mere assurance that they are going to sing is an assurance that the music will be of a high quality.

This mass meeting will begin promptly at three o'clock, and will conclude at four o'clock. This arrangement has been made in order that those who may have engagements for the afternoon, will be able to fill them and also attend the address.

TO ORGANIZE TONIGHT.

Debating League Will Be Made a Reality By Action of Clubs.

Tonight a mass meeting of the members of the different debating clubs of the University will be held in the law lecture room at 8 p. m. sharp.

The new constitution will be presented and read and motion made for its adoption.

Everyone interested should be present and take part in the discussion of the different sections to be voted upon.

If the new constitution is adopted the officers of the organization will be elected and the first regular debate will be held.

The object of the organization is primarily to promote fellowship among the members and to secure a stronger organization of the students of the University who are interested in debate.

The most vigorous efforts will be exerted to secure thoroughly prepared discussions of up to date questions in political economy, sociology and current events.

The sentiment of the students is decidedly in favor of this movement and all feel the need of such an organization, not only for the discussion of present questions, and topics, but also for the practical work in parliamentary drill which it affords.

In fact our school seems to be about the only one where a vigorous student debating organization is lacking.

Students should be better acquainted with current topics and events, and if there is anything manifestly to be deplored it is the general inability of students to handle a parliamentary meeting of any kind.

The movement deserves the support of all and there is no reason why it should not be a complete success in every way.

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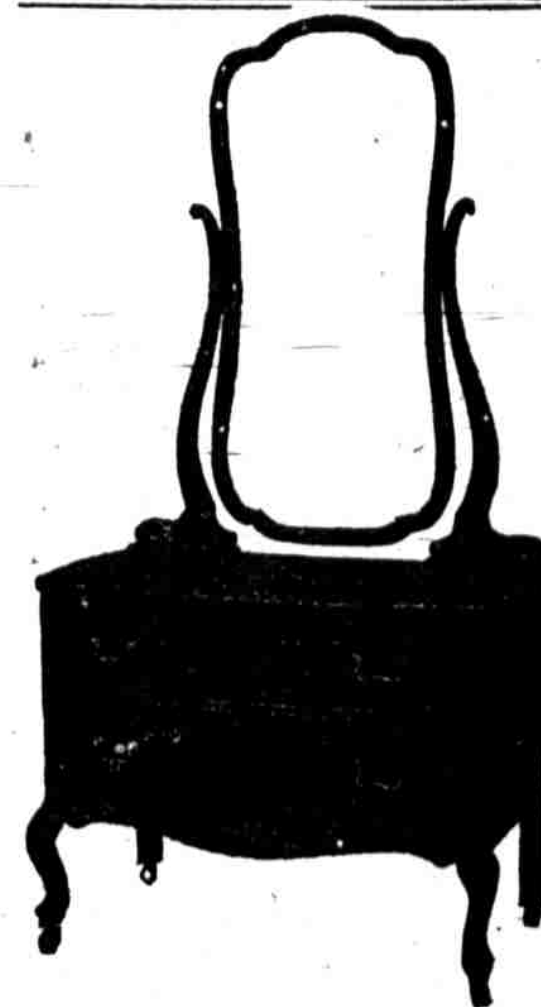
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
