At other institutions the Glee club members are given so many hours credit for their work, but our boys gain nothing in this line. They are in their work body and soul, and deserve the hearty support of the University and the citizens of Lincoln. The program consists of music usually avoided by glee clubs as too difficult, and includes some such pieces as "The Hunting Cry of the Seonoe Pack," "Drink to me Only with Thine Eyes," etc., which despite their difficulty have been quite mastered by the club. Mr. Bates, who read for the club last year, has again consented to appear, and he will prove a great drawing card.
