## A GREAT CONTEST

Debate with Kansas a Hummer Preparation for Other Contest

Many prominent citizens of Lifncoln concur In the view that the debate was wel fought out by both sides and that th Nebraska men showed surprising strength in handling their arguments. The Kansas men took thear defea in good grace and seemed well pleased with their stay in the city. They departed Saturday forenoon for Kansas There had been talk of getting up a party or ten or tweive members of the Kansas raculty to accompany then and moral support to the good wil of their representatives.
