TRACK TEAM BACK.

Account of Colorado Meet by Our Athletic Editor.

Yesterday afternoon at 2:36 the track team returned from their trib to Bolder, defeated but not discouraged or down-hearted. They all had a good time on the trip and did all that could be expected of them.

The score of 74 to 34 would seem to indicate that Nebraska was completely out-classed, as she only got two firsts, but such was not the case. Coach Cropp of the Colorado team said after the meet that had the meet held in Nebraska or in lower altitudes, the result would have been very close.

That is the way all the men felt. Colorado certainly had a very strong team, especially in the sprints and weights, Johnson making the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat.

The only objectionable features of the meet were the high nititude and the starters. These seemed to be rather inexperienced at the business and unintentionally caused the Nebracka men to lose out in two or three instances.

The team's treatment at the hands of the Colorado men was all that could be asked for.

The team left Lincoln at 3 a. m., and arrived in Denver at 9:45 p. m., where they put up at the Adams hotel,

The next morning the men took in some of the sights of Denver until 10:50. The team got into Boulder just in time for dinner and were out the field by 2 o'clock.

The bleachers were well filled with weaters of the silver and gold by the time the races were begun. The day was ideal and the track was fast, being made of cinders.

The two-mile race had to be abandoned to allow the team to catch their train at 4:35, bringing them to Penver at 6 o'clock, from where they started in time_to get home yesterday afternoon.
