TO OFFER REPORT

College Settlement Board Will Submit Constitution This Morning.

New Members to be Elected. - Prof. Caldwell Will Talk.

The convocation period this morning will be given over to the college settlement board. A mass meeting has been called, to which all members of the faculty and student body are invited: Reports of the past year's work will be presented by the treasurer. Professor H. W. Coldwell, and by the president, Professor Grummann. An election will be held to fill vacancies en the board of directors, in accordance with the constitution and bylaws published below, which will be submitted to the meeting for adoption. One faculty member, and four student members are to be chosen.

COLLEGE SETTLEMENT ASSOCIA-TION-CONSTITUTION. Article I.-Name.

The name of this association shall be "The College Settlement Association of Lincoln, Nebraska." Article II.-Objects.

The objects of this association shall be (1) to maintain a college settlement house in the city of Lincoln in the state of Nebraska; (2) to encourage students to reside in such house; (3) to promote and organize non-resident work in the neighborhood adjacent to said house, and (4) in general to promote and direct the spirit of helpfulness and ministry to others

Article III.-Organization. The membership of this society shall consist of all members of the faculty and student body of the University of Nebraska who have contributed to its support, and all other persons who contribute \$2,00 or more annually. The government of this society shall be vested in a board of directors consisting of ten members, four of whom shall be students of the State University elected by the student body, three of whom shall be elected by the university faculty from their own number, and four of whom shall be elected from among other citizens of Lincoln by the board of directors. The student members of the board shall hold office-for one year. The faculty and citizen members of the board shall hold office for three years and their terms of office shall be so arranged that one new member shall be elected annually from the faculty and one from the non-university membership. The board shall elect by ballot from their own number a president and a secretary. They shall also elect a treasurer. The board shall have power to appoint such committees as it may deem expedient to carry on the work of the society. The board shall have power also to hire and appoint resident and other assistants to conduct the work of the society. It shall be the duty of the board of directors to manage the property and control the funds of the society, to take suitable measures for the attainment of the objects of the society, and to submit a written report of the year's work at the annual meeting. The board shall adopt its own by-laws and shall have full power to act for the interest of the society in any exigency not provided for by this constitution.

Article IV.-Meetings. The annual meeting for the election of faculty and student members of the board and hearing of reports of officers shall be held during the first three weeks of the first semester of the college year. Special meeting may be called on three days' notice by the president or three members of the board. At a meeting for the election |

Article V .- Amendments.

Amendments may be adopted by a two-thirds vote of those present at an annual meeting of the society or at a special meeting provided that notice of the intention to make an amendment has been given in the call for the meeting.

> BY-LAWS. Article I.-Order of Business. Article 11.-Meetings.

The regular meetings of the board of directors to be held on the first Saturday of each month at the College Settlement. Special meetings of the board may be called at any time by the president or by any three members, provided notice be given.

Article III.-Funds of the Society. All funds of the society shall be turned over to the treasurer and he shall keep as near as possible a list of the names of those who have contributed and a record of all other sources of revenue. The funds shall be-kept in a bank and paid out only on checks. Bills will not be paid until they have been allowed at a meetreport shall include the sources of allreceipts and a classified list of all expenditures and an account of contributhe year.
