CONVENTION OF EDITORS.

College Editors Meet in St. Louis
This Summer.

The first national convention of college editors was held in the Hall of Congresses, of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition on July 22, 1904. The meeting of the editors was presided over by Dan McFarland, of the M. S. U. Independent, with J. A. Porter, of "The Wabash" acting as secretary. About eighty editors were present and attended the ousiness sessions during which various problems of college journalism were discussed.

Although not every section of the country nor a large number of big schools were represented, nevertheless for a start in organization a very creditable representation both by sections and by schools was made.

Representatives from the Universities of Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Stanford, Michigan, Drake, Chicago, Columbia, Illinois, Indiana, Pardu and Ohio were present, together with a large number of representatives of smaller colleges.

The editors attended in a body the first contest of the recently organized National Oratorical association, after which over sixty editors sat at the banquet table presided over by Dan McFarland.

Among the subjects discussed at the business session were 'The Position of the College Paper in the School," by H. G. Fisher of Drake University; "The Daily Paper in College Journalism." by H. M. Pratt, of Iowa University: "The Exchange Column," by L. R. Whipple of Missouri University; "The Pulitzer School of Journalism," by the editor of the Columbia University Spectator. Plans for a permanent organization of college editors were discussed by a committee composed of S. M. Frank of the Independent, J. H. Palmer and W. H. Tucker. An informal organization was formed with the purpose of holding another convention next year at which a full scheme of organization should be adopted. E. F. Nelson, of the University of Mis-Souri, was elected president of the Association, with H. W. Pratt, of lowa. secretary. These men with an executive committee of five chosen from the different geographical sections, are to push the work for another convention and for a formal organization.

The editors were shown courtesies by the exposition management and the various concessionaires which were thoroughly appreciated. It was largely due to the exposition that it was possible to hold the convention, although convention is due to the work of Mr. J. A. Porter, of Wabash College, who first conceived of the idea.—Mirrouri Independent.

OFFERS PRIZES.

Chicago Uni. Offers Prizes for Short Essays.

The University of Chicago has oflered three cash prizes aggregating \$6,000 for the three best monographs upon the subject, "The German Element in the United States, with Special Reference to Its Political, Moral, Social and Educational Influence." It is enabled to do so through the generosity of Mrs. Catherine Seipp, who has established the competition in the memory of her husband, Conrad Seip) The monographs are to be finished and delivered to the Germanic department of the University of Chicago on or before the 22d of March, 1907. They may be written in either English or German. The successful author will receive one-half of proceeds from sale of the book in the first ten years. Competition open to all.

There will be three judges of the competition. One of these will be Hon. Carl Schurz and a second will probably be Embassador Andrew D. White. These two will select a third.
