*In Other Colleges*

The University of Minnesota suffered severe loss last week by fire. The fire started at 5 o'clock in the morning and before the fire department could be called the flames were beyond control. The main building was the oldest landmark of the university, being completed in the early seventies. It contained the German, Latin and mathematical departments, the ladies' parlor and library, which were entirely destroyed.

The German department suffered a loss of 1,800 volumes, valued at \$3,000. The next heaviest loss was that of the English department. The Y. M. C. A. lost \$100 worth of furniture and a valuable piano. The individual student loss will probably amount to \$1,000. The mail was saved by the bravery of a student, Oscar Warman, who guided the firemen to the P. O. department.

Classes were speedily resumed and the mining building, formerly sacred to the men, has been thrown open to the co-eds.

The University of Illinois took notable action in the case of a number of their last year's football players. The athletic board of control barred four varsity ball players, who played on semi-professional teams during the summer, from university athletics.

The board last summer adopted the rules of the conference colleges, which provides that a college man may not play for money or on any team, any member of which receives money. It seems that four men, Pfeffer, Warner, Byers and Cook, violated these rules and were open to suspension.

Five men were suspended from the university for hazing. This action was taken by the council of regents.

Great excitement has been caused at Syracuse, N. Y., by an affair of the upper classmen. They assembled in a body and thrust themselves upon the faculty and as the chancellor said in a most severe speech to the students, "obtruded roughly into the presence of ladies and when detected ran like hoodlums." The affair was especially criticized, as the students had just past a number of resolutions of good conduct.

A cross-country track team has just been organized at Syracuse University, with K. B. Squires as captain.

The Berkeley students are becoming most energetic in the dramatic line. October 13 and 14 they will present the powerful Greek play of "Ajax." The play itself will be preceded by a religious procession in which over 100 men, women and children in costumes will participate.

One of the largest pieces of granite ever quarried in the state of California will be used to arch the main entrance of the new campus building at Berkeley.

The application for rooms at Vassar has been so large that only a few freshmen of this year will be able to reside on the campus. Applications have already been made for 1,911.

A new institution of note at Sanford is the fire house just erected. This is thoroughly equipped and will be in charge of six university students, who desire to work their way through.

The University of Montana will this year issue the first annual published by any college of that state.
