Foot Ball Men Start This Afternoon for Colorado.

This afternoon at 3:20 the team leaves for Colorado from the Rock Island station.

Colorado last Saturday defeated the University of Utah 33-6. Utah's score being made on a fumble and a resulting 105-yard run. The game is described as one of eleven men together against eleven individual players, with the usual result.

The Colorado papers are devoting a good deal of space toward showing on paper that Nebraska's overconfidence, together with Colorado's real ability, will result in the defeat of the Cornhuskers.
