Miss Mamle Eustus of Auburn, Neb., was the guest of her cousin, Miss Allie Lurlong, for a few days last week.


Miss Nell Randolph of Omaha will be the guest of Miss Ella Harper at the Kappa Alpha Theta house the last of this week.
