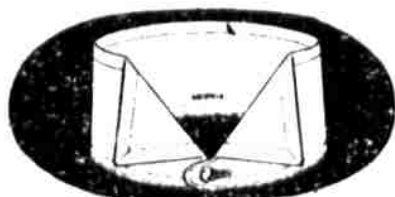

Campus Gleanings

The thirty-seventh regular meeting of the Nebraska section of the American Chemical Society, will be held in the chemical lecture room of Wesleyan University, Friday, Oct. 28. The program will be as follows: "Non-volatile Nitroso Compounds," Dr. F. J. Alway; "Equivalent Weight Determinations in Rare Earth Work," Dr. Benton Dales. Professor H. H. Nicholson is president of the Nebraska section of the society, Prof. S. Avery vice-president, and Dr. Benton Dales, secretary.

The Nebraska Experiment Station has just issued Bulletin No. 86. It contains a report of experiments previously conducted in the use of poisons for destroying prairie dogs, and the results obtained recently in fumigating with some very cheap substances. The bulletin may be obtained free of cost by residents of Nebraska upon writing to the Agricultural Experiment Station, Lincoln, Neb.

The Roosevelt League held a short meeting in Memorial Hall yesterday morning and elected an assistant secretary, the correspondence of the society being too heavy for one man. At the meeting of the American Library Association, held in St. Louis last week, Prof. J. I. Wyer was elected treasurer.
