Nebraska Alumnus May Return to Legislature.

The university is again represented in public life by Hon. C. J. Warner, an alumnus, who is fast striding forward in the political ranks of the state. He is a candidate for the third time for a seat in the house of representatives. Mr. Warner was graduated from this university, after which he began the study of law but before completing his course he was unanimously nominated by the republicans of Lancaster county for the legislature. After his first term he spent one year in the law department of Columbian university, Washington, D. C. He was elected to his second term by an increased majority. During both these terms Mr. Warner was a strong advocate of university needs.

He was chairman of the committee on state university and normal schools in his first term in which capacity he did much good for educational interests. The most direct benefit to the university was his successful attack on the measure which was pro-

posed to cut the university levy from one to three-fourths of a mill.

During his second term he introduced house roll No. 1, which provided for a new normal school for the western part of the state. This created increased interest in educational institutions among the western members. He was largely instrumental in securing the passage of the university appropriation bills which provided for two new buildings on the campus and the new building on the farm. For his work for the university during both sessions he was commended by the chancellor. Mr. Warner's district comprises all of Lancaster county and his friends in the university are glad to have the opportunity to show their appreciation of his work.

Dr. Woods Will Speak.

Dr. A. F. Woods, chief of the division of plant pathology and physiology will speak to the botanical seminar Friday at 4 p. m. in the botanical lecture room. As this is an "open meeting," all who are interested are invited to attend. He will discuss the botanical work which is being done by the government botanists, and of the training which is necessary to enter the government service.
