Yesterday morning at convocation, Dr. J. W. Jones of St. Paul's Methodist church, gave a short talk. Dr. Jones paid Chancellor Andrews a high compliment. He stated that Dr. Andrews coming to the west had drawn the eyes of the east to the university of Nebraska as nothing else could have done.

Dr. Jones pleaded for a greater attention to divine influence in everyday life, and urged prayer as the logical means for securing a higher view of life. He was of the opinion that every person should unite with some church and take an active part in its management. He also believed that every man should take a keen interest in politics, since this, he asserted, will prove necessary to the best interests of the country.
