New Library at Stanford.

Foundations of the new university library, the last of the large structures to be built to complete the structural scheme as originally planned by the founders of the Stanford university, are now well under way and the work will be continued as rapidly as possible.

In style of architecture the new library will combine the Spanish of the buildings of the quadrangle with the Romanesque of the gymnasium, and in general appearance will be much more ornate than any of the other buildings of the university. The ground dimensions of the main structure will be 304 feet in length, with a width through the wings of 98 feet and through the stackroom of 200 feet. The circular addition to the rear embracing this stackroom will have a diameter of 132 feet. In height the building will be three stories and basement, surrounded by a beautiful glass dome of 90 feet in diameter, which will afford excellent light to the general reading room below. The total height from the ground line to the top of the dome will be 141 feet.

The contract for the laying of the foundations calls for an expenditure of \$25,000, and the cost of the stone and brick work will be \$217,241. The cost of the interior decoration and equipment of the new structure will probably increase the entire cost to about \$600,000.

VERY INTERESTING.

Prof. Sweezy's Lecture Enjoyed by a Large Crowd.

Convocation period yesterday was given over to Professor Sweezy, who delivered the first of a series of lectures on Astronomy. His subject was the planet Mars, and the lecture was illustrated by a number of lantern views.

Prof. Sweezy took up the differences between earth and Mars and spoke of the difficulty of getting views, even with the best telescopes. The atmospheric conditions and probable vegetation was discussed. A comparison with the moon showed many and interesting facts concerning this, the most important planet. The canal system was spoken of at some length and opinions of leading astronomers given. The lecturer gave his opinion that if Mars is inhabited that the inhabitants have a higher intelligence than ours.

In conclusion Professor Sweezy stated that most of what we think we know about the planets, is only theory, though well confirmed by observation with telescopes. Another of the series is promised as soon as some new slides are received. One commendable feature of the period was that the doors were closed when the lecture commenced, thus preventing interruption, which is so common by a number of our unthinking students.
