Y. M. C. A. Notes.

Sunday morning Bible classes will meet as usual.

N. P. McDonald was a visitor in association rooms and about campus yesterday. He is now located in the city and expects to enter the law school next fall.

Regular cabinet meeting was held in association rooms Wednesday evening. The reports of the chairmen of the various committees were encouraging. Other matters of business were considered and disposed of.

A. W. Billing said in the meeting yesterday noon, speaking on the subject "Where, When and for Whom" He referred more particularly to the mission work, saying that in the last two years ten University of Nebraska people had gone into foreign fields.

The number of men attending the noon prayer meetings from 12:20 to 12:30 in the rooms is steadily increasing and a good healthy spirit is noticeable. Today M. J. Brown, president, will speak on "The Spirit of Prayer." Members and others who are interested are invited to be present.

Organization of the work at the state farm is proceeding steadily. Several of the men have applied for membership and Bible classes will soon be started. It is now quite certain that one of the professors at the farm will head one of these classes. A great deal of encouragement is had from the enthusiasm of every member of the faculty at the farm and the interest displayed in the initiation of the work in this important and growing school.

President Brown has transferred A. C. Bates to the chairmanship of the Bible study committee. Mr. Bates has his committee well organized and expects to bring about a large increase in the number of those doing a daily and systematic study of the Bible. Mr. Bates is well known for his excellent and finished work in the Elocution department and will no doubt be able to "do things" in this important branch of association work.

President Brown has also made Mr. Harry Poston chairman of the college settlement committee to succeed Mr. Bates. Mr. Poston has for some years been doing faithful and telling work in the settlement, where his services are indispensable.

Another appointment of importance is that of Mr. Hugh E. Wallace of Omaha as chairman of the publishing committee to succeed Mr. Roy Bickford, who did such successful work in the publishing committee to succeed the publishing of this year's "Handbook." Those most directly interested in association work are pleased to have the services and interest of Mr. Wallace, who in the short time in which he has been in the university has shown himself to be a man of more than ordinary ability.
