**What is Happening in Debate Elsewhere.**

California high schools have organized a debating league for the state high school championship.

The Dartmouth-Brown debate will be held in Providence in January. Dartmouth will defend the affirmative of the following question: "Resolved, That it would be advantageous for the United States to admit Canadian coal and lumber free of duty."

Wesleyan won the annual debate with Williams at Williamstown. The question was: "Resolved, That the government of territories and of alien peoples by the President and Congress of the United States unrestrained and unqualified by the Federal Constitution necessarily will be injurious to our republican institutions and to our form of government." President Hopkins of Williams tendered the team and judges a reception after the debate.

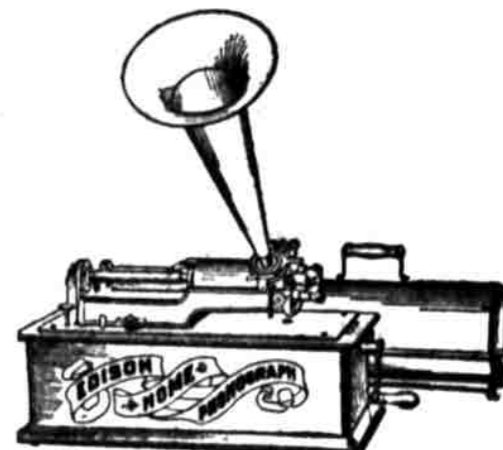
