## ANNUAL BANQUET

Large Number Expected at the Cornhusker Banquet.

Price of Tickets is Reduced.—A Good Program Promised.

The second annual Cornhusker banquet will be given Monday, December the 12th, at the Lindell hotel at 8:30. Last year was inaugurated the custom of giving a public banquet in honor of Nebraska university football team. The banquet last year was a success in many particulars, in some it wasn't. Financially it was a failure, the committee in charge going in the hole some \$80. This was due, largely, to the price of tickets, which was \$2 per plate, too high for many who wished to take advantage of this opportunity to show their appreciation of the team. This year, with a better menu, the price of plates has been reduced to \$1.50. A good program of toasts will be furnished, and a general good time had. This is an opportunity that should not be missed. It is a chance for the men to get together round the festive board, renew old acquaintances, make new ones, and enjoy the spread with the team. The committee in charge is a competent one, and everything possible will be done to make the thing a success. The students now should do their share by everybody buying a ticket. The banquet will be dry, but the toasts, and the good time will be far from arid.

### ROUNDING INTO FORM.

Basket Ball Schedule Begins to Assume Shape.

The basket ball schedule is beginning to assume definite shape and a number of games have been virtually settled already. A great many minor colleges wish to be represented on the schedule, but probably cannot be accommodated.

It is probable that the usual western trip will be taken. Colorado university desires a game, as do also Denver college, the Highland Wheel club, of Denver, and Cheyenne Business college. With the trip almost assured, several other institutions are corresponding for dates, which, if arranged, will provide a splendid trip.

Wisconsin intends to make a western trip again this year, and may be taken on. They have already arranged for games at Iowa, Kansas, Haskell, and Washburn. Iowa also would like a game with Nebraska, according to the Daily Iowan, but it is not known where the game would be played if scheduled, owing to the fact that no final correspondence has been passed between the managers of the two teams.

As has already been announced, the first team plays at Wesleyan this evening. Next Friday Highland Park will play on the local floor. The men who will play tonight have not yet been chosen.

This afternoon the championship of the academic classes will be settled, when the Junior and Sophomore class teams line up at 2 o'clock against each other. At 3:30 the Senior Laws and the Freshman Laws will fight out the question of the championship of the law department. Early next week the victors in the game will contest with the victors of the Junior-Sophomore game for the championship of the university.

The second annual Cornhusker informal has again been postponed on account of conflict with another university function. It was feared that holding the Y. W. C. A. County Fair and the informal on the same evening would prove disastrous to both, particularly on account of the fact that almost all of the fraternities and societies are to take some part in the former. No new date has been determined upon for the informal.

This makes the second time that the informal has been postponed. The girls' Pan-Hel. dance caused the first conflict, and the management went to considerable expense to secure a new date. The County Fair had announced December 10 for their entertainment, but the affair had not been well advertised yet, and the informal management was unaware of the conflict. The Cornhusker banquet a week from Monday also influenced the second calling-off of the date, inasmuch as it was not desired to run the two events too closely together.
