ALL-CLASS TEAM

Nebraskan's Expert Announces
Choice of Teams.

Several Laws on It—Would be Swift
Aggregation.

The mania for picking all-star teams seems to have hit the college press in every part of the country this year, and almost every paper on our exchange list has had its "athletic expert" choose an All-American team. The only similarity between these teams is the strange fact that each "expert" picks about six of the men of his own team for places. The only "expert" that seems to have been able to look beyond the end of his own nose is the man who picked the team for the Syracuse Daily Orange. That team has men on it from every part of the country, and only one Syracuse man is picked, and he for the second team at that.

Quarter—Lantz, Law '06.
Halfbacks—Little, '07, and Cook, '06.
Fullback—Schmidt, Law, '07.

University Beats Wesleyan by a
Single Score.

The basket ball team defeated Wesleyan Saturday night by a score of 32-31. The score does not indicate the strength of the Nebraska team, for they played against great odds. The Wesleyan floor is very small, being much below the regulation size of a basket ball court, and the spectators were seated along the side lines and many times interfered with the game. Probably the most serious objection to the court is the lack of out-of-bounds territory, at the end, which hindered the work of the Nebraska men materially. Wesleyan profited by all these, especially the walls at the end. The Nebraska team was permitted to use their team work but very little, but the individual work was fine. The work of Captain Hoar at guard, and Meyer, at center, were especially worthy of mention.

SOPHOMORES WIN OUT.

Second-Year People Defeat El-
ders in Close Battle.

A large crowd of some ten or fifteen persons witnessed two very exciting games of football on the campus Saturday afternoon. The first one was between the Sophomores and the Juniors to decide the winner of the Academic class championship. From the showing of the two teams in their previous games an easy victory for the Sophs. was looked for by most of the rooters, but from the first kick-off until the last five minutes of play it was a question as to the winner. Cock at half for the Juniors made from ten to twenty yards around the end or through tackle time after time, and for a time it looked as if the Juniors had the game hung up. In the last part of the second half the Sophs got their machine in working order and bucked their way the length of the field for a touchdown just before time was called. Little smashing through tackle for three yards after being held twice without any gain.

The second game was between the Senior and Freshman Laws for the Law championship, and was the best exhibition of football seen on Nebraska field for many a day. The Seniors received the kick-off and failed to make their distance the very first time. Ringer panted and on the first play Johnson broke away for a touchdown. In the eight minutes left to play the Freshmen repeated the operation twice and the half ended with the score of 16 to 0.

Coach, Captain and Trainer Ringer put some ginger into his men during the time between halves, and his team developed a very strong defense. The feature of this half was Cotton's carrying the ball 135 yards for the Seniors in 17 downs. His magnificent defense prevented the Freshmen from scoring during this half.

By winning this game the Freshmen won the law championship, and by the new rules adopted this year have a right to play the Sophomores for the university championship.

WON'T PLAY THEM

Sophomores Refuse to Meet the
Freshman Laws.

They Claim the Championship Despite
the Rules.

Next Thursday morning at 11 o'clock, the inter-class athletic board is scheduled to meet for what is expected to prove one of the stormiest sessions in its history. The occasion of the call is to award the inter-class football championship. This has been won in the academic department by the Sophomores and in the law department by the class of '07 (Freshman). The latter have challenged the former to a match for the championship of the university, but the Sophomores refuse to play.

Just what the outcome of the matter will be cannot be even guessed at with assurance. The rules passed by the board early this fall would seem to favor the case of the laws. Those which bear on the case read as follows:

"V. The teams shall be paired off as follows in football and basketball: Freshmen-Sophomores; Juniors-Seniors; Winners-Winners; Freshman Law-Junior Law; Winners-Senior Law; Winners of the Academic championship vs. winners of Law championship. The last game shall determine the championship of the university.

"VIII. Any game ending in a tie, other than the final game, must be played off, and any team refusing to play shall be defaulted. The managers of the two teams may agree to divide the money and championship in case of a tie final game, but either manager may demand a play-off."

On just what grounds the Sophomores refuse to play is not known. The laws, of course, claim the championship by default.

Basket ball practice will be held every evening this week in final preparation for the game with Highland Park Friday evening. The men are in good form. Last night some lightning work at passing and goal shooting was done. The price for the game Friday night has been set for 25 cents per. This is for the game only. Those wishing to dance after the game will be charged 75 cents per couple. This 75 cents includes admission to the game, and the privilege of dancing afterwards. Good music will be furnished for the occasion, and a good attendance should be on hand to take advantage of the two attractions.

A CLASS RUN.

Arrangements Made for Cross-
Country Contest.

In order to keep the cross-country men in training and to keep up enthusiasm in the work, an inter-class run will be held some time during January, for which a number of handsome trophies have been given by Lincoln merchants.
