work that this excavation practically calls for a manufactory, necessitating a maximum amount of work by machinery and a minimum of human labor.

While the Isthmian canal commission favored the high-level canal, the work which has been done to the present by the Panama canal commission has put the sea level canal in a more favorable light as to expense, time of construction, etc., than has appeared heretofore, and it will not be surprising if the construction is done accordingly.

Dr. Ross discussed the political and economic influence of the canal on the Pacific coast.

Water transportation, he said, has an advantage over land transportation in the matter of rates. Today the cheapest railroad rates are five times as large as the cheapest rates by water. The opening of a new line of water communication is therefore bound to have important commercial effects. It will also have striking political effects. The people of the Pacific slope will be particularly benefited by the canal. California has been isolated from the east in spite of trans-continental lines of railways, because of the great obstacles to land transportation. At one time the state was so seriously in the grip of a grasping railroad corporation that her industrial development was handicapped. The canal will insure a wonder development on the Pacific slope. It will also promote unity and nationality in the country. As to foreign relations the canal will give us an opportunity to regain the eastern trade lost in the opening of the Suez canal.
