ELECT MORRISON

Unanimously Chosen to Guide Football Finances.

NEW UNI. PUBLICATION

The Launching of an Accredited School Paper.

The Accredited Schools Committee, on suggestion of Inspector T. M. Hodgman, heartily endorsed the plan of a University monthly paper, devoted to the interests of accredited schools of the university. To a sub-committee consisting of Professors Barber, Fling, Caldwell, Fossler and Hodgman, was assigned the duty of selecting a board of editors and perfecting details. A monthly four-page sheet similar to the Academy News in size, devoid of advertisements, was decided upon, and the following board of editors nominated. C. E. Persinger, managing editor and representative of the History Departments; R. H. Wolcott, Science; Louise Pound, Languages; Supt. A. O. Thomas of Kearney, Industrial Education, and T. M. Hodgman, Accredited Schools Interests. In addition, Registrar Clark was asked to run a column on university news items, and Mrs. Virginia Clark, in the interests of the Teachers' Bureau. A circular letter has been sent out to the members of the faculty explaining the object of the paper and soliciting departmental contributions. The first issue is planned to appear January 15th. Such a medium of communication between the university and the accredited schools has long been needed.

At the election of officers of the Palladian Literary society last Friday evening, the following officers were elected: President, Miss Minnie Petraskek; vice president, Miss Elta Boose; secretary, Mr. W. In further explanation of the above report some things are to be noted. For example, \$68.35 of the training table expense item is for permanent equipment, dishes, stove, etc. The per centums and guarantees under disbursements are made to visiting clubs. Under equipment and supplies are included apparatus, suits, etc. Some of the accounts are carried over from last year, and have been settled from this year's proceeds, the item for baseball equipment, advertising account the Journal, etc. Vouchers for every cent paid out are on hand in the treasurer's office and open to public inspection at any time. After all bills are paid for this year, and last year's old accounts straightened up there is a cash balance on hand of \$900.45, which is somewhat better than a deficit of about the same amount which stared the Athletic Board in the face last year. A supplementary report is soon to be printed from Manager Davis, showing the receipts and expenses connected with each game separately. A few bills are yet outstanding which will reduce this balance perhaps \$200.

The marriage of Miss Elsie Fawell, of Lincoln, to Mr. Edward L. Thornton of Chicago, occurred last night at the home of the bride. Miss Fawell is a university alumna, and a member of Kappa Kappa Gamma, one of the most popular girls in school, and a leader in Lincoln society.

For some time pictures have been arriving and have been stored in the Art room, and will be unpacked and hung Thursday, as soon as the building is vacated by classes. Many of the pictures to be on exhibition come directly from the art palace of the St. Louis exposition, and thus a rare opportunity will be offered to see some fine works which would be unavailable under ordinary circumstances. The Art association is composed of Nebraskans, mostly citizens of Lincoln, who by their annual dues guarantee that expenses will be borne each year.
