letter, my "intellectual passport." It served me well at both the Bodleian and the British museum. At the latter place we worked ten days. We had less time at Cambridge, but accomplished much more in results. I am editing an old play and at these various places was gathering material, calling texts, etc.

Here we are at Frieberg settled to the greatest years work of my life. I wasted some time at Heidelberg, on the supposition that I could be allowed examination privileges at the end of one year, as I have known of that condition in the past there. But I found they had recently changed their rules and now require two years in Germany, and at least one at H. As I have already to my credit three good years of graduate work (partly at U. of N. and partly at Chicago Uni.), I felt it was not doing right by myself to stay there. But I had so little time left before matriculations closed, to investigate elsewhere. At H, the authorities told me practically all the German universities were following the same regulations.

However, a swift correspondence gave me choice of several universities in Germany, besides Vienna, Bern and Zurich. All gave me most cordial invitations and whenever I presented my credentials, I was told I had already done all that was required for a doctorate. But one must reside here a given time. At one Uni. I was offered the privilege of examination in six months. But I didn't want to do it in so short a time. I know better than anyone that what I want to accomplish and how I want to accomplish it. I have therefore chosen one of the hardest of all the propositions offered me, and if I can get ready in a year on that I shall be satisfied.

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Law Annual, 1898-1904



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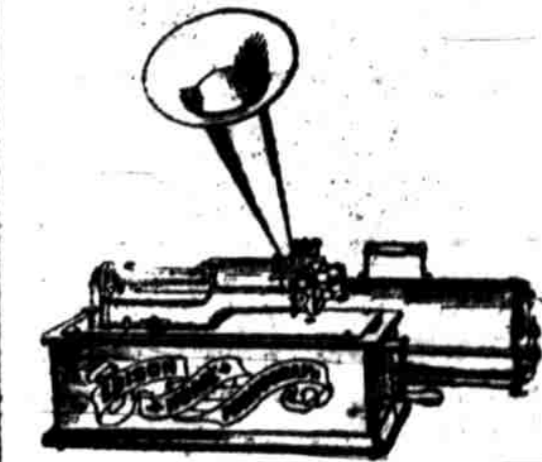
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
