RECEIVES A GIFT

Bust of Goethe's Margherita Given by German Department.

It is Now on Exhibition in the Art Room.

One of the prominent features of the art exhibit is the bust of Goethe's Margherita, which occupies a position directly within the entrance. The bust is of pure Carrara marble and is the work of the renowned sculptor, Antonio Frilli, the work on it having been done in the famous studio of that artist in Florence, Italy. The statue was selected by Professor Fossler of the German department last summer when he was in St. Louis and was received here on New Year's day. The bust is the gift of the German department to the university. After the exhibit it will be placed for a time in Professor Fossler's room and for a time in the general library, where it may be more public. Only through a great deal of sacrifice was the German department able to make this gift to the university. Funds that could readily have been expended elsewhere were saved and thus this new addition to the artistic wealth of the university was obtained.

Taylor Commends.

Miss Edith L. Those that chose the newly acquired Margherita could not have done better. From cold marble the artist Frilli has drawn forth a maiden of passing simplicity. Every detail is simple and the whole effect is one of simplicity. When this is said all is said, yet not even a beginning has been made in describing Margherita. To be appreciated she must be seen, not once, but many times, for she can be understood only by close acquaintance.

During the holidays the alumni of Lincoln high school held a reunion party at Walsh hall. About 40 couples were present and the affair was one of the pleasantest enjoyed by high school people this year. A large proportion of those present were people now in the University. An unusual feature of the occasion was the fact that the management gave a substantial rebate to each man, the receipts having more than balanced expenses. The Basketball Men are Hard at Work.

Trips Up North and West Are Now Being Planned.

The basket ball men are practicing every evening from five to six for the trip north the last of this month. Manager Beers is arranging games with teams between here and Minneapolis. Probably the first game played on the trip will be with the Omaha Y. M. C. A. This should be a good game, as the Omaha aggregation defeated Highland Park team, which in turn defeated the Nebraska team. But the Nebraska team will be playing much faster and better ball when they meet Omaha. They had practiced but little together when they played the Highland game. Besides this game and the two with Minnesota, the manager will have two others, making five games played on the trip.

A trip west is also being arranged by the management, which will probably take place during or near the Easter vacation. This will probably extend as far west as Cheyenne, playing a team in that city. The game with the Cheyenne "Giants" has already been arranged and other games with University of Colorado, Greeley and Colorado college will likely be arranged. Besides these trips, other games will be played around through the state and at home.

The next time the Nebraska basket ball team appears in a game they will have on their new suits which have been lately purchased and will arrive today. They are very similar to old ones, that is, the black pants, black jerseys with the scarlet ring, the cream "N" in the center. The suits will add materially to the appearance of the team on the floor.

Manager Allen of the baseball team has almost completed his baseball schedule for this season's games. He has arranged a trip in which the team will play with Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota universities. All of these games have been pretty definitely settled with the exception of Minnesota, and this institution seems to be holding back from the fear that they will not be permitted to put a team in the field. Other games will be arranged to be played in Lincoln.

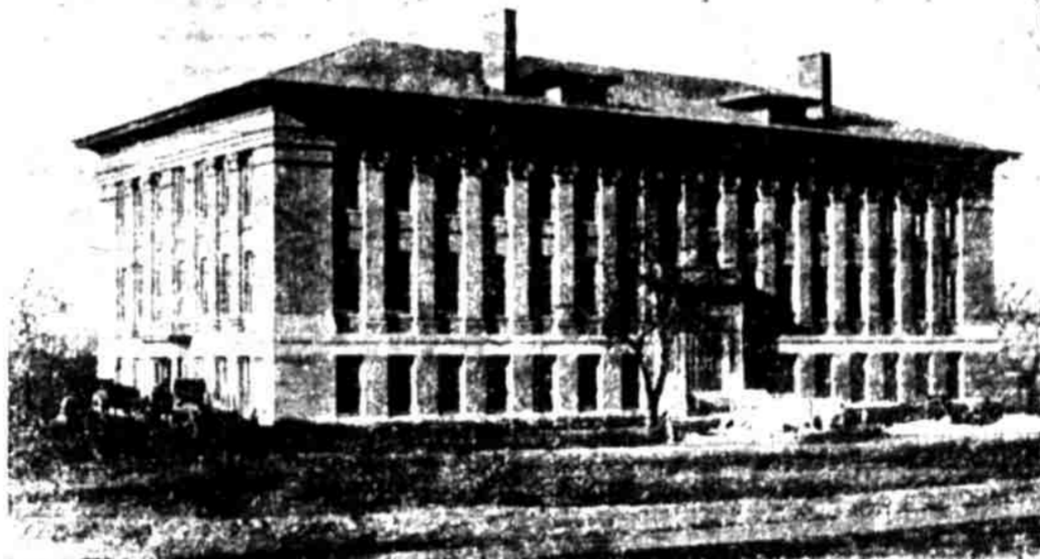
MEMORIAL EXERCISES
