In Other Colleges

Yale has a bureau of self-help which, in the past three years has alded hundreds of students to stay in college by opening opportunities for them to entirely or partially support themselves.

A Pan Hellenic movement which has for its object the systematic study of the Bible and the promotion of an inter-fraternal fellowship has been started at the Ohio State University.

A new technical school about to be built at Birmingham. England, will cover 30 acres, and will include a whole city of shops. One of its features will be a model mine occupying an acre of land.

The receipts of the California-Stanford game this year are said to be the largest in the history of western football. The total receipts were \$30,308, and the approximate expenses \$1,000, making \$29,308 to be divided between the two colleges.
