# STILL OBSTINATE

Captain Chase Still Continues to be Arbitrary.

He Attempts to Thwart Basketball

The old grudge held against the military department by the athletic interests, which has lain dormant for some time has again broken forth and a clash seems to be imminent.

The basketball men are the aggrieved party in the case and the trouble seems to be caused by commandant Chase stoutly refusing to excuse a couple of basketball players for a night or two in order that they could put the time in on practice.

A basketball man when interviewed last night stated: "Capt. Chase never did favor athletics and can see no good in anything except his narrow sphere of 'Militarism.' Almost any department in the university would have been glad to excuse the men but of course his department is so much more important and superior to other departments that perhaps he ought to be excused.

The military department instead of helping athletics along has always hindered it and such will continue to be the case as long as the present management is in charge. Former Commandants have always been glad to co-operate with athletics and have in turn received their co-operation, but a change seems to have come over the spirit of our dreams the last years. I should think the military department would be decent to avoid its present unpopularity among the students if for nothing more.

As far as I know there has never been a concession made for athletics by the present military department except under pressure, and I cannot see why such obstinacy exists."

A reporter called at the office of commandant Chase but he happened to be at the state farm, so it is impossible to print his side of the controversy.

#### Play Committee.
