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
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Campus Gleanings

In Other Colleges

In the triangular chess league composed of Pennsylvania, Cornell and Brown, Pennsylvania won, with Cornell and Brown in the order named.

The faculty at Iowa has taken a decided stand against plagiarism. One student guilty of plagarism in an oratorical contest was summarily expelled from the University.

Harvard won the recent eastern intercollegiate chess tournament with Princeton second, Columbia third and Yale last. Of the thirteen tournaments played, Harvard has won 8, Columbia 4 and Yale 1

Mr. Frank E. Force, sporting editor of the Minneapolis Tribune, speaks in terms of ridicule of the eastern critics, Camp's and Whitney's, all American football teams on the grounds that they do not know western football and hence are incompetent judges.
