The Engineers Get Three Class Presidencies.

The three men elected to the Senior, Junior and Sophomore presidencies vesterday are all engineers. In the Senior election, Mr. White was put up and backed, primarily, by the engineers, but in the other classes the fight was not waged at all on Lit-Engineer lines.

The Seniors met yesterday morning to elect officers. Two names were placed before the class, that of Miss Grace Coppock and that of R. H. White, Before the ballots were counted the balance seemed to be slightly in Miss Coppock's favor, the girls being in the majority and it was supposed that they would stand solidly for Miss Coppock, Surmise, however, proved incorrect. The first ballot gave Mr. White 63 votes, Miss Coppock receiving but 47. Miss Mary Harris was elected vicepresident by a unanimous vote, and to Miss Minnie Petrashek for secretary. Miss Eva Cooper, the treasurer of last semester, was re-elected to this position unanimously. The only contest made was between the candidates for presidency. Mr. Hunter, after a few words of thanks to the class for the loyal support and co-operation given him, was selected as sergeantat-arms.
