A strenuous effort is being made at the Academy to make up the deficit in the Athletic Association's treasury which comes as a result of a lack of support on the part of the Academy students during the 1904 football season. The Academy management was compelled to call off the game with York high school, which was to have been played in Lincoln, because of a lack in funds in the local treasury. The equipment was furnished by the association this year for the first time and the receipts of the games failed to meet the expenses of the year.

A thorough canvass of the students is being made by a committee for subscriptions. So far about twenty-five dollars has been subscribed and the major part of the deficit will probably be made up.

The bills have all been paid by the manager and principal and they are depending upon the students to reimburse them.

The Sophomore basketball team are arranging other games with college teams in the vicinity of Lincoln. The men under Captain Bowman practice every day and have secured good team work. The individual playing of these men is also very good. In all probability a game will be played with Lincoln Academy. A return game with Wesleyan is expected.

The basketball game between Nebraska and the Omaha Y. M. C. A. team will take place on Wednesday night. Manager Beers will have reserved seat tickets on sale at the co-op the first of next week. The Omaha team has been practicing hard for this game and a very close one is expected.

The debaters met in Prof. M. M. Fogg's office last evening and the general plans of work were discussed. Prof. Fogg outlined the work but no committees were appointed. These committees will be appointed on next week and another bibliography given out.
