UNIVERSITY JOURNAL.

According to present plans the first issue of the University Monthly Journal will be out about the twentieth of this month. The Journal will resemble the Outlook in appearance, will be a two column eight page magazine, about ten inches long. The paper is designed to be a medium of communication between the University and the secondary schools of the state. There will be three departments; one for the University proper; one for the School of Agriculture, and the third for the School of Music. Pictures of the buildings of the departments represented will be published.

The magazine will contain hints from the University faculty as to the proper high school methods of teaching and text recommendations.

This paper will be sent to high school principals, high school superintendents, high school teachers, presidents and secretaries of boards of education, the editors of the state papers to one thousand selected addresses on the part of the school of music, and also to one thousand addresses selected by the school of music. This will require a total edition of about six thousand copies.

Registrar H. G. Shedd will be managing editor and will have the following assistant editors: C. E. Persinger, Louise Pound, A. O. Thomas, R. H. Hodgman, Mrs. Virginia Clark, A. E. Davison, Willard Kimball and E. H. Clark.

SUMMER SCHOOL.

Director Hodgman placed the material for the summer school catalogue in the hands of Professor M. M. Fogg and Registrar H. G. Shedd last Thursday evening. The material was placed in their hands for revision. The director is planning to offer over forty courses and nearly that number of the University faculty will be engaged either to instruct or to lecture in the summer session. This is the most extensive program ever offered to University students and public school teachers.

Two innovations will be noted in the program. One a course in school music offered by Mrs. C. B. Raymond and Miss Fanny Arnold, of Omaha. The other is a course in Meteorology given by Professor G. D. Swezey. The latter course is planned to supplement the course in physical geography given by Professor Condra. The medical college has also decided to offer a course in Human Anatomy for the benefit of medical students. This course will be given by Dr. Poynter. Twelve thousand catalogues will be issued from the press during this month and the matter of the advertising the summer session will be vigorously prosecuted by the director and registrar.
