gineers have in their dealings with unscrupulous contractors, who put inferior material into their work when the specifications call for certain grades of material, and if this is not prevented by the engineer, the work will be inferior and when it begins to wear prematurely the engineer gets the blame at the hands of the tax payers. The success of an engineer depends, in a commercial way, according to Mr. Rosewater, on his ability to withstand these difficulties and to succeed in compelling contractors to live up to their specifications, even though he has a corrupt board or council behind

Mr. Rosewater's talk lasted for about two hours and he closed by asking the students to question him informally on any points not covered in his remarks and he responded to the queries of the embryonic engineers with willingness and understanding.

Aylesworth at Chapel.

Yesterday at Convocation Prof. Aylesworth gave an interesting illustrated lecture on "Lincoln in Portrait and Caricature." Such a subject, he said, was very appropriate on the anniversary of Lincoln's birthday. Prof. Aylesworth showed a number of slides. of various portraits of Lincoln, taken at different dates. The first picture was the earliest known portrait of Lincoln, taken in 1848, at the age of 39. Other pictures following portraying him at the time of the famous Lincoln-Douglas debate in 1858, during the campaign of 1860, at the time of the Emancipation Proclamation and ending with a picture of him taken five days before his assassination. All of the nortraits exhibited the force of character, determination but kindliness of the martyred president.

The second part of the lecture consisted in views of the caracatures and artoons of Lincoln, during the campaign of 1860. Some were very humorous, playing upon the extraordinary length of him and of his fame in telling jokes. In particular the cartoon of Lincoln's presidential race with Douglas in which the former is stepping over the "little giant" is very significant. The lecture and pictures were thoroughly enjoyed by all who were


