Bowdoin college has the only inter-collegiate snow shoe club in this country.

The University of Cincinnati was recently presented with a gift of \$5000 and a library.

Princeton is soon to break ground for a new \$130,000 dormitory, the gift of the classes '92 to 1901 inclusive.

One hundred and thirty men reported as candidates for battery positions on the baseball team at Yale.

A chapter of the honorary fraternity Phi Beta Kappa was recently established at the University of North Carolina.

A Harvard graduate of the class of '54 has bequeathed \$250,000 to his alma mater, to be expended as the authorities of the institution desire.

The Delta Gamma sorority at Wisconsin has accepted plans for a new building to be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the next collegiate year.

Columbia has lately issued a pamphlet stating that the proposed School of Journalism, for which Joseph Pulitzer has donated \$2,000,000, would not be opened until the death of the founder. There are at present over a thousand applications for entrance to the proposed School of Journalism.

R. W. Rose, the holder of the world's record for the shot-put, is now in Ithaca, taking steps to enter the University. That Rose does not come to Cornell with the idea of devoting his entire time to athletics is shown by the fact that for one year at least he will be unable to play on any University team. He will enter the college of law.

The women at Northwestern University seem to be very much opposed to the early breakfast hour in one of the dormitories. A recent demonstration is said to have taken place in which the young women with horns, bells and dishes led a procession through the corridors of the building before day-break. The rule which is causing so much trouble requires that the dining room doors be closed at 7:25 o'clock in the morning.

President Elliot of Harvard, in a recent discussion concerning football said: "On the question whether or not football victories do, as a matter of fact, contribute to the growth or reputation of a college or university, there are evidently two opinions. But if a college or university is primarily a place for training men for honorable, generous and efficient service to the community at large, there ought not to be more than one opinion on the question whether a game played under the actual conditions of football, and with the barbarous ethics of warfare, can be of a useful element in the training of young men for such high service."
