THE GLEE CONCERT

A Large Audience Listens to a Good Program.

Glee Club's First Appearance is a Complete Success.

Before a good sized and enthusiastic audience the Glee club made its initial appearance last night at the Oliver theater. For months Directors Eames and the members of the club have been working faithfully and this consistent work told last night. songs were well sung and with one or two slight exceptions, smoothly Lack of public appearance caused a couple of unnoticeable slips but aside from this the club's part was well taken. The first half of the program was made up without any stunts, attention being paid more particularly to the finish of the pieces sung. On the second part, however, many of the stunts characteristic of the college Glee club were given and the numerous encores told that the second was the more popular part.

The quartet singing the very appropriate "knocks" during intermission was called back until all their knocks had been used up. The chants by the second quartet were as well received.

Between halves of the program the Cadet Band, with Mr. Hagenow as director, played four numbers in their usual excellent style. The band was composed of 48 pieces and rendered the difficult selections in an admiraable manner. Mr. C. L. Meyers' rendition of the "Poet and Peasant" received the hearty encore it deserved. In response he played "I Love You All the Time" and was again encored. Mr. Fred Funnan accompanied him admirably. Mr. Bates, in his inimitable selections, "Wakin' the Yongins" and "Encouragement," and was forced to respond to two enthusiastic encores.

The stage decorations, which were quite elaborate, consisted of a scarlet background, with "Nebraska" in large white letters thereon. University pennants of other colleges were hung from drop curtains and formed a border for a quorum present at that time. the scarlet background. From the drop curtain streamers of scarlet and cream were draped to the upper boxes. Palms completed the stage decorations. The boxes were all draped in University colors. The programs, thanks to the untiring energy of Mr. Dirks, were by far the most elaborate of anything in that line ever used at a University function. They were in the shape of a booklet of thirty-two pages, and centained besides the program and the nomes of the patronesses, a cut of Chancellor Andrews for a frontispiece, cuts of prominent University athletes and athletic managers. BOOK STORE FIRE

Uni. Book Store Almost A Total Loss By Fire And Water.

Origin Of Fire Unknown. Building And Stock Partly Insured.

Fire in the University Book store last night destroyed about threefourth of the stock. The origin is unknown and the fire had been smoldering for some time when discovered.

By prompt action of the fire department the damage was confined to the rear end of the store where a large stock of new books had just been placed. The remainder of the stock was damaged considerably by smoke

The stock is owned by D. B. Gilbert and R. C. Phillips and was partly insured. Damage to the store building was slight as the fire did not get much headway.

Quite a number of students witnessed the conflagration as the reception given by the Glee club in the Art hall had just broken up.

REGENTS RECOMMEND

The regents of the University have voted fifty thousand dollars for the erection of the north wing of a state museum. The present museum is entirely inadequate and much of the collection now in the hands of the curator is stored in the steam tunnels on the campus. Some specimens have been in these tunnels for eight or ten years. The steam pipes have not been set up yet and when they are the material will have to be taken out and stored somewhere else on the campus. Should this appropriation pass the legislature it would be of great value not only to the University but also to the whole state.

Ex-Regent Morrill will donate five thousand dollars to be paid in installments of one thousand dollars a year for the collection of valuable clay quarry products, soils, bossils, etc. when a suitable place to store the specimens shall be provided.

Another Invasion of Enemy Territory Next Week.

Varsity Five Starts Snuday for a Series

of Games,

On Sunday at 1:45 p. m. the 'varsity basketball team will leave over the Northwestern for their extended eastern trip. Six games will be played on this trip, five of these being played with Wisconsin teams. The team will be away about eight days on this trip.

The first game will be played on Monday evening, Feb. 20, with the Maroon basketball team of Port Washington, Wis. On Tuesday the 'varsity will meet the team representing Ripon college at Ripon, Wis. The third game will be played with the Young Men's Social club of Menasha, Wis.

Thursday evening the 'varsity will line up against "Deac" Koehler's colts of Lawrence University, Appleton, Wis. Many of the older students remember Koehler as one of Nebraska's foremost athletics in '02-'03. It was largely through his efforts that the trip to Wisconsin was arranged. On Feb. 24th the last game in Wisconsin will be played against Carroll college, at Waukesha, Wis.

The last game played on the trip will be played against the Chicago Central Y. M. C. A. This will be the hardest game played on the trip as the Central team is one of the fastest teams in the country. Little can be said of our prospects on this trip as we have no line on these teams,

Nebraska has never met one of these teams before. The length of the trip will be a severe handicap, but the men will start in good condition and should win a majority of their games,

The Women's Physical Training Department with Mrs. Clapp at its head has experienced great success in the past few years. The results of the work have been most gratifying both to the department and those taking work in it. Many of the graduates have finished to accept good positions in Y W. C. A. high school, college and University work, and still requests come for women to take positions in other colleges and universities. At present there are four graduates of Nebraska in universities, four in colleges and four in high schools and one in Y. W. C. A. work.

Miss Stella Elliot, one of the oldest graduates, has charge of the Physical Training Department of Ohio University. She graduated in the nineties. Miss Heaton, who graduated a year later, has charge of gymnastics at Baker University, Miss Alberta Spurch and May Edholm are carrying on the work at University of Washington and University of Chicago respectively.

In the college work are Misses Guile, Whiting, Fowler and Wallace, Misses Guile and Whiting have both had charge of the work at Doane college and were very successful. Miss Fowler carried on the work at Nebraska Wesleyan last year but was compelled to give up the work. She was succeeded by Miss Betha Wallace, who is conducting the work this year.

The girls who are employed in high schools are Misses Gertrude Macomber and Edith Higgins in the Omaha high school; Miss Bess Dumont in the Rochester high school, New York, and Miss Spurch in the Lincoln high school. The Omaha Y. W. C. A. physical training department is conducted by Miss Mary Meeker.

There are three women taking work at Nebraska this year as a result of recommendations given them by eastern university men. About two weeks ago a letter was received from Leland Stanford University offering a position to a woman in their Physical Training Department.
