All candidates for the 'varsity track team are urged to come out Saturday. Feb. 18 at 2:30 p. m., when the regular work will begin. Dr. Clapp wishes all candidates to come out in order that they may get form and be in good physical condition when weather permits outdoor work to begin.

It is probable that meets will be arranged with Colorado (in Lincoln), Minnesota (at Iowa City), Ames (at Ames), and South Dakota (either at Vermillion or at Sioux City).

It is also possible that Nebraska will send a team to the Minnesota Relay Carnival to be held about May 1st. This will be patterned after the Pennsylvania relays and gold watches for firsts, silver watches for seconds, and medals for third prizes will be given. Winning teams get banners.

The gymnastic contest for places on the Chicago team will be divided into two parts. At each semi-contest only part of the apparatus will be used. The first one will be held Wednesday evening, Feb. 22, and if Dr. Clapp is successful in his plan, the various gymnastic events will be interspersed with semi-finals and finals of an inter-class relay potato race. About one month will intervene between the semi-contests and the best men in both will receive ribbons. No cup will be given this year but the man making the most points in both contests gets an "N." Saturday, Feb. 18, is the last day on which entries for the gymnastic contest will be received.
