Dr. Condra gave a short talk on the city Y. M. C. A. and its benefits at the Academy chapel last Monday. The doctor dwelled to some extent on the work that the Y. M. C. A. is doing for the young men of the city and urged the Academy students to join and enjoy its benefits. He spoke especially of the athletic side of the association and urged the Academy boys to organize a basketball team. As a result of his talk the men of the Academy have decided to get up a basketball team. So far about a dozen have signified their intention of playing and two teams are assured.

A fine collection of sand-line bricks made by the Huennecke system was received by the Department of Geology last week. The bricks are composed of 95 per cent of sand and 5 per cent of lime. The process of manufacture requires no heat or burning. The collection has attracted considerable attention, and several Nebraska men have gone east to visit the Chicago branch of the establishment with a view to establishing plants in Nebraska. Professor Barbour has collected and sent several kinds of Nebraska sands and sent east for testing purposes.

Senior Annual.

The material for the Senior annual is almost ready for the press. The editor and business manager have found that they can not make the quality of book that they desire without a larger sale than the book has heretofore demanded. They have accordingly issued a circular letter, which they are mailing to members of the senior class, stating the proposition plainly and asking members of the class to pledge themselves to sell two or more copies of the annual. The circular letter says in part:

"A book equal to that of last year can easily be put out, with no financial loss, estimating a sale of one hundred and fifty copies at 75c apiece. Or, if three hundred copies be put out at the same price per copy, it is very probable that Albertypes can be substituted for half tones, as was done in the Law Book of last year; also, a second new feature can be introduced in the shape of a cloth-board binding such as is used on the Sombrero. Evidently the definite co-operation of the whole class is needed, and, if given, will make possible the best Senior Annual yet published at the U. of N."

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
