ENGINEERING NOTES.

Hartzell have taken as the subject for their thesis the determination of the cost of lighting an isolated house with electricity furnished by a small dynamo, driven by a Cushman two-cycle gasoline engine. The engine is one that has been used at the State Farm in the course in Farm Machinery and was delivered at the shops yesterday, but the dynamo has not arrived. This is a very practical subject on which there is but little data and as the gas engine is coming to be very commonly used on the farm, there is a demand for more information as to the cost of running them to furnish light for the various buildings on the farm.

CHICAGO FELLOWSHIPS.

Fellows are supposed to give their time primarily to the work of one department.
Applications should be filed here not later than March 1, 1905, as appointments are made the third week in March.
