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## BOOK DISCUSSED

**Juniors Devote Meeting to Sombrero Talks.**

Innovations in Contents Promise to be of Interest.

The Junior Class meeting yesterday was handed over to the Sombrero board the members of which reported on the general progress of the work. The editors of the annual, Mason Wheeler and Charles Mathewson spoke on the general scope of the book. The size they announced would be about the same as that of the last Sombrero. In quality of binding and printing, however, it is to be much superior to the annuals of any previous years. A beautiful leather cover is to be substituted for the former cloth binding. The engravings are being prepared by one of the best firms in the country. The book will contain 34 square inches more of engraving and 200 square inches more of half-tone work than the last edition.

The publication of a superior book which will incur a greatly increased expense on account of the leather cover, improved engravings and typographical work, is an experiment with the board and in order to prove success at least 700 copies must be sold. The total cost of publishing the book exclusive of the cost of engravings will be \$1.39. The Sombrero will sell at \$1.50. Such a close margin eliminates any opportunity for "graft" which has heretofore characterized the control of this book and assures to the students a book the price of which goes into the book rather than into the pockets of the board.

In addition to the report of the editors in chief short speeches were made by the editors of each of the various Sombrero departments.

Mr. Earl Denny, editor of the Athletic Department, reported that an innovation will soon be announced in regard to that department. It will contain photographs and accounts of the football, baseball, basketball and track teams of the two past years.

Mr. C. L. Waldron certified that his experience with books had assured him that the declaration of the editors last year that the publication would be on honest principles, had been faithfully carried out.

Miss Martha Kline, editor of the "Jokes and Roasts" Department, announced that a quantity of excellent material was on hand but that any further contributions would be welcomed.

Miss Leta Stetter, editor of the Literary Department, reported that two short stories and a number of sundry poems would constitute the literary contribution.

### Barbs Meet.

A fair sized crowd attended the meeting of the Associated Barbs held in U 106 last evening. The matter of an amendment to the constitution defining the rules of eligibility to the organization came up and after considerable discussion it was voted to appoint a committee of three to prepare an amendment which should be considered at the next meeting of the association.

President Anderson presented the matter of adopting a "barb" pin for members of the association to the meeting. He stated members of most of the other organizations of the University wore some insigna and that something of the kind would be a great convenience to the organization. The question was postponed until the next meeting.

The president further stated that the Sombrero management had offered to give the association one page in the annual free should they desire it and asked an expression of sentiment on the question. After considerable discussion it was voted to refuse the offer on the grounds that the publicity thus given the organization might be detrimental to the interests of the association. The prevailing sentiment seemed to be that the purpose of the association is not to fight the fraternities but rather to promote the general welfare of the whole University and that the "write-up" in the annual would tend to give the impression that the association was set up in opposition to the fraternities and would thereby widen the gap between them and hinder the association in its attempt to promote the "general welfare" of the whole university.
