Editorial Remarks

The Omaha World Herald for Thursday, the 23d, contains the startling double scare-head "Nebraska Should Spurn the Rockefeller Offer," and cites in support of this astounding statement the resolutions introduced by Representative Hunker in the house yesterday. The resolution is given herewith in full that the absurdity of the World Herald's stand may be fully appreciated. The last portion of the resolution, in particular, specifically denies that Nebraska's acceptance of money to be devoted to a good cause in any way supports the questionable methods of the Standard Oil company. "Whereas, The people of the state of Kansas have entered into a contest

sums toward the erection of a building in connection with the Nebraska State University, we desire that it shall be known that the acceptance by Nebraska of the contribution which John D. Rockefeller has made to the university temple fund shall in no sense be regarded as an apology on the part of Nebraska people for the disreputable methods which the Rockefeller monopoly has employed. We desire that it shall be distinctly understood that the acceptance from John D. Rockefeller of a considerable sum of money, the same to be used in the erection of a Nebraska university building, shall not serve before the people of the world as an indication that Nebraska has any sympathy whatever with the dishonest practices and the outrageous impositions for which John D. Rockefeller's great monopoly is responsible."

When the above resolution came up for action an amendment was offered striking out all reference to the donation of Mr. Rockefeller. Various reasons were brought forward in support of the amendment, but the general tenor of all was that to pass the resolution intact would be to raise a corpse out of the grave; that the matter had been thoroughly threshed over before. Chancellor Andrews was eulogized in the highest of terms, and his position with regard to this donation was commended as right. The bill, as amended, passed by a vote of 63 to 12. The house of representatives of the Nebraska State Legislature thus saw fit, after mature deliberation, to justify the stand Chancellor Andrews has taken, and to place the seal of its approbation upon his acceptance of this gift to the University. The World Herald yelped its last yelp just in time. Doubtless a few post-mortems will be indulged in, as a sort of balm for hurt feelings. But any argument that the World Herald can now put forth will be immediately refuted by the expression of the House of Representatives.
