**Editorial Remarks**

**Concert Proceeds.**

The various committees connected  
with the home concert given by the  
Glee club have all reported and nearly  
every account has been wound up.  
With a possible slight subtraction or  
two the balance Manager Dirks re-  
ports is \$305.67. The total receipts  
of the concert amounted to \$586.50,  
while the expenses incurred were  
\$281.83, which leaves a snug sum to

add just so much to its credit. For  
a long time we did not have a glee club  
at Nebraska. As yet we do not have  
a mandolin and guitar club, nor a ban-  
jo club. Material was found for a Glee  
club well worthy to represent Nebrask-  
a, and there are enough men in the  
University who play some instrument  
to compose other musical clubs. It is  
too late, now, to organize such clubs  
this season, but steps should be taken  
early next semester looking toward  
the establishment at Nebraska of a  
mandolin and guitar club or a banjo  
club. There is no reason why the suc-  
cess achieved by the Glee club this  
year cannot be rivaled by other Uni-  
versity clubs next year.

The Junior class meeting today will  
be for the purpose of cleaning up the  
balance due on the "Freshmen Cap"  
deal. The funds raised by the sale of  
the '06 caps of this year was not suffi-  
cient to meet the balance so other  
means must be adopted.

The Juniors have been very loyal  
as a class and have stood back of the  
movers of the cap burning very well  
financially and there is no doubt but  
they will until the last vestige of the  
debt is swept away. The class spirit  
has prevailed in this case as it does  
in but few cases. Notwithstanding  
the action of the men burning the '08  
caps was not authorized yet the class  
stood by the action of the minority  
in this case.

**More Funds.**

The State Historical Society has  
asked the Senate Finance Committee  
for an appropriation of two thousand  
five hundred dollars to be expended in  
the publication of the debates of the  
State Constitutional Convention of  
1871. The record of these debates was  
recently discovered in the State House  
vaults by Mr. Sheldon, of the Historical  
Society. They were transferred to  
the society by the recent resolution of  
the Nebraska House of Representa-  
tives. The Historical Society desires  
to publish the records in two volume  
form of six hundred pages each. A  
third volume may be published which  
will contain all the original material
