Additions to the museum are being made constantly and the store room already so inadequate is packed and a large amount of the material is stored away in the steam tunnels on the campus. Some of the specimens have been in these tunnels for seven or eight years. An attempt is being by the Board of Regents to secure the appropriation of fifty thousand dollars for the erection of a north wing of a state museum. This is included in the general appropriation asked for by the Regents. Should this appropriation pass the legislature it will be a great benefit not only to the University, but also to the whole state.

Ex-Regent Morrill, who has always taken an active interest in the work, will donate five thousand dollars, to be paid in annual installments of one thousand dollars, for carrying on the work of collecting material, when a suitable building shall be provided for the storing of the collections.

Among the more important specimens received in the last week is a collection of cocoons of silk worms. The donor is Dr. George Szogyeny, commissioner general for Hungary at the world's fair.

Ralph Rose no longer holds the world's record for the sixteen pound shot put. At the indoor meet of the Lawrence Light Guard association, held at Medford, Mass., Saturday night W. W. Coe, of Somerville, Mass., established a new record of 49 feet 17-8 inches. Rose's record is 48 feet 7 inches.
