Some queer bills have recently come up in the legislatures of several states. The Daily Minnesotan contains the following interview with President Faunce of Brown University, and the opinion of a supporter of the anti-fraternity bill:

"The bill introduced into the legislature to abolish fraternities has succeeded in again arousing the oftmooted question.

"President Faunce in an interview published in a city paper ably sums up the situation:

'In the eastern colleges, the fraternity and sorority are held in high esteem, particularly those which have a definite aim toward which they are striving. I find in my work as president of Brown the strongest backing from the fraternities in the institution and it has been my pleasure to give such mo:al support to them as I am able.

'I might name numerous instances where had I not the support of the fraternity men I would have been at an utter loss to know haw to have settled the matter in hand equitable to all

'The fraternities are to my mind one of the greatest influences in the colleges of this country. They can have influence for good or evil. They develop a man in countless instances where no other force could have drawn him out. The atmosphere surrounding the college fraternity life is such that the most lasting friendships are there culminated, friendships ending with
