Editor of the Daily Nebraskan:

Sir-Of late there has been almost universal complaint, and fustifiable complaint, among the cadets against the tardiness of the military department in dismissing the battalion. The grounds of such complaint are by no means of recent origin, having been prevalent at least during the whole time the present "generation" of cadets has taken military work. However, the manifest delinquency of the military department in regard to this matter is becoming of late more serious and it is thought that if the attention of the department is called to this evil it will be speedily remedied.

The bugle is sounded for the companies to "fall in" promptly at 5 o'clock, and the recall should of right be sounded in time so that the battallon may be dismissed at 5:50. However, it rarely occurs that the cadets are dismissed before 6 o'clock, and not intrequently the period is lengthened to five or even ten minutes after six. Not only is a period of such undue length very wearlsome to the cadets. and not only does the lateness of the dismissal prove inconvenient to many who have engagements at 6 o'clock but the retention of the battalion until this untimely hour is in violation of the privilege of the students as laid down by the university regulations. The official class period is fifty minutes. With rate exceptions every other class in the university is dismissed promptly at the appointed time, but the military department, unique in this as in many other respects, possesses the exclusive privilege of expanding the hour ten or fifteen minutes.

It is for the purpose then of calling the attention of the military department to this failing that I write this communication. In making this complaint I am sure that I voice the sentiment of every cadet in the battalion and no less in making the request that the privilege of the cadets be respected. to say nothing of their good will being fostered, by arranging the work of the military department so that the recall be sounded at such a time that the necessary conventionalities attending dismissal be completed promptly at the close of the period.
