"Dear Manager: I guess Neptune must get all the Nebraska news for there are many "Nebraskans" which don't arrive here and I suspect Uncle Sam of throwing them overboard in order that the aforesaid Neptune may keep posted on Nebraska doings. The cause is so worthy that I can't feel justified in calling down the mail man.

"Things go along here in the same old way. Last week we had a little more excitement than usual. Monday one of the treasurer's checks broke out with smallpox so we all went up and had our left arms washed and a little virus inserted. On Tuesday there was a big fire in town which was prevented from wiping out the whole town by the bravery of two policemen, natives, who tore down several burning shacks in order to keep the fire from spreading. In the shuffle they were very badly burned. The following day one of them died and the other was seized by an attack of the lock-jaw. Dr. Dudley cured that after a week's work, but said the poor fellow could not live unless he had a lot of new skin grafted on his legs. They tried to get the policeman's family to donate the necessary skin, but all except his wife deserted him; next they tried to get his brother policemen and friends to "skin" up, but "no saben." Then they tried to get natives around the town to sell some skin but were unable to buy any; as a last resort the doctor applied to the Americans and more for the purpose of shaming the natives than from any special love for the hombre, we all went down to the hospital and went up against the "skin game." He took about three or four square inches from my right arm and about that much from the others.

"We had a big baile or dance down at Sulpan on Saturday night; a big banquet and a gay old time we had too. Did you read the recent article in the Century Magazine about the prominent of the Filipinos—Felipe Buencamino? It was at his place and was the anniversary of the wedding of his daughter, Victoria, with Lieutenant Andrews of the Seventh Cavalry. Danced till 4 a. m. and then went to the Governor's house and slept till 8 o'clock when we took the train for San Fernando. We do these little stunts every once in a while. Celebrated the Governor's birthday on Tuesday with another dance. Don't think I'm getting entirely frivolous; I've been working very hard during the last month, every day night and Sunday.
