Protest Made.

There is little likelihood of any protest lodged against Johnson as western inter-collegiate gymnastic champion being heard. The individual championship, awarded in Chicago at the meet two weeks ago, was given to the man having the highest number of points as shown by the judges scoring, and not to the man winning the greatest number of points as shown by first, second and third, for his team. This method of scoring was clearly understood by the members of the association before the meet, and was as clearly understood by them afterwards. Zeidhark, the man who won Wisconsin's greatest number of points, and who won more points considered from the positions of first, second and third, than any other man, was given ninety eight points by the judges as against one hundred and two for Johnson. The decision giving to the Nebraska man the individual championship will undoubtedly be sustained.
